Afternoon: Considering the victim in contemporary feminism: #MeToo and the redeployment of rape culture

This mock lecture will critically examine the legal, feminist, and historical context of the #MeToo movement and two terms it mobilizes: rape culture and consent. These twin concerns inform current feminist projects that support punitive sanctions – including prison and disintegrative shaming – of men who have perpetrated sexual assault. In so doing contemporary feminists appear to have forgotten some important critiques of and by their predecessors, namely how the emphasis on the terrorized woman victim and the demonization of the male sexual offender perpetuate gendered norms of female sexual passivity as well as expectations amongst criminal justice actors privileging the ideal woman victim.
